AREYOU READY IN AN EMERGENCY?

The following is a list of a well stocked first aid kit for dogs.

- Roll Cotton
- Some cotton balls
- Gauze pads
- Gauze tape
- Hydrogen peroxide (check the expiration date)
- Hydrocortisone ointment
- Antihistamine tablets
- Scissors
- Eyewash
- Silver Nitrate
- Tweezers
- Oral Syringes
- Pediolyte or other balanced electrolyte fluid
- Baby Food Meat Flavors work best
- Large Towel
- Exam Gloves
- 1 inch white tape (in addition to gauze tape)
- Rolls of elastic wrap
- Emergency ice pack
- Thermometer (oral or rectal can be used rectally)

A well stocked first aid kit should be in your home, but definitely if you travel with your dogs.



RESEARCHERS IDENTIFY GENE LINKED TO EXERCISE-INDUCED COLLAPSE IN LABS

Researchers at the University of Minnesota College of Veterinary Medicine and the University of Saskatchewan's Western College of Veterinary Medicine say they have identified a gene in Labrador retrievers that is highly associated with the syndrome called exercise-induced collapse (EIC).

Labradors affected with EIC—about 3 percent to 5 percent of Labs are said to have this condition—may start to lose control of their hind limbs after intense hunting or retrieving exercises. In most cases, their legs get wobbly and the limbs give out. In rare cases, they may die, according to researchers.

"This is groundbreaking because this is the first naturally occurring mutation of this gene identified in any mammal," said James Mickelson, Ph.D., professor of veterinary sciences at the University of Minnesota and co-principal investigator on the study. "Its discovery could offer insight into normal as well as abnormal neurobiology in both animals and humans."

The finding will also help dog breeders gradually reduce the number of Labradors with the trait in future generations. Researchers have determined that up to 30 percent of Labradors are carriers of the mutation, and they have developed a genetic test to indicate whether dogs have the normal or mutated forms of the gene.

Owners can have their dog tested through their veterinarian by submitting a blood sample to the University of Minnesota Veterinary Diagnostic Laboratory.

This is a caution that while these announcements are interesting, sometimes the claims get ahead of the actual effectiveness of the test. (Remember Optigen?) Be aware also that producing the test is a money venture, and can affect the speed these tests are produced. As we look for the perfect animal, we seem to narrow our genetic pool that is considered "risk free". Just limiting your gene pool can create even more problems.



LAB LESSONS

Give a young retriever time to grow into hunting By Kelly Bostian (reprinted from the Tulsa World)

Longtime hunter Richard Colton didn't fire a single shot on opening morning of waterfowl season this year. And he had a fantastic time. As the morning's hunt wrapped up, he looked at his 2-year-old black Labrador, Bailey, and said, "That was just right. She got just what she needed."

It was Bailey's first duck hunt, so for Colton, the day was all about the dog.

Four of us were on the hunt. Colton had his shotgun with him, but as I lay in a blind on the shore of a pond with hunters Roger Schelling and Clint Hall of Wagoner, Colton was about 30 feet behind us with Bailey, hidden at the base of a tree but with a clear view of the hunting scene.

"It was a good morning, and it clicked on her that when the calls started going off, she needed to start watching for birds," Colton said. She also tracked and retrieved her first wild crippled duck, a gadwall.

Colton walked with her across the pond to be right there all the time. "I saw the duck in the grass but I wanted her to be hunting for it," he said. "It was good experience, with the flapping wings and everything – and it was a good thing it was a small duck."

Colton is former president of the Three Rivers Hunting Retriever Club and describes himself as a self-taught dog handler. He has trained several of his own dogs over the past 30 years, helped others with their dogs and has been a serious student of the subject the past dozen years or so. He has been around enough to know that opening day and first hunts for young dogs are critical moments, sometimes underappreciated by hunters new to handling a dog.

Even though Bailey is a little older than other first-timers and has had a great deal of training and practice with live birds in training scenarios, Colton said the introduction to actual hunting situations will take time and a deliberate effort.

"She's seen a lot of marks, but she's never had three shotguns going off at once," he said. "You have to work a young dog into it."

On their next hunt, Colton plans to move a little closer to the guns. The next time he will move in with them and have the dog by his side. "I'll just be noting how she is reacting as we go along," he said.

A mistake some hunters make is expecting too much from a dog on its first hunt. A serious error some make is getting angry when the dog doesn't perform as they think it should. Shouting when a dog already is confused only serves to make things worse. "They're better off pulling the dog back and just starting over," he said. "It has to be fun for the dog. I probably go overboard. I'm sure I look like an idiot out there sometimes, 'Ohhh, what a good dog, good dog! What a dog! Good dog!"

Basic obedience and retrieving is only a basic start for a dog, he said. New types of locations and situations make everything new again. It's up to a handler to keep an eye on the dog, watch its progress and when necessary, take a step back, help the dog learn what is expected and build up its confidence. "It's like building a jigsaw puzzle," he said. "The more pieces you put together, the easier it gets. You let them see this part, then this part, then this part, and all of a sudden it comes together and it's whole."

And no two dogs are the same. Cindy Leonard, a professional trainer who owns Grand River Labrador Retrievers, said she has heard many tales from new handlers since waterfowl season opened on Nov. 1. She told a story of 1-year -old litter mates, a male and female, with similar training backgrounds.

The female had a tough day. The pup had been worked with live pigeons, ducks, was trained to fetch on command and had her obedience down. "But all they shot on opening day was two geese, no ducks. She had never seen a goose. She wouldn't pick them up." She said.

The dog's owner did the right thing by bringing the birds to shore for the dog. "He played with the dog and eventually she would go out and bring it back by a wing or neck," she said.

The dogs litter mate was with a different party and retrieved five ducks and two geese opening morning. "I think the difference is he got the ducks before the geese fell," she said. "It got his confidence up."

The main things are to make sure the dog has a good time and concentrate on helping the dog, rather than shooting ducks. "I tell everyone, when you go the first several times, it's all about your dog," she said. "Your dog will be with you in the field for eight to 10 years, so don't get in a hurry. Concentrate on the dog and let someone else worry about the birds."

IS YOUR RETRIEVER READY?

Retriever handlers refer to a dog that is ready to experience its first waterfowl hunt as a "started" dog. Is your dog started?

- **Is solid on obedience basics off-lead (sit, stay, heel, come)
- **Has been force-fetched or at least fetches reliably
- **Has been introduced to gunfire (as large as 12 gauge shotguns nearby)
- **Has been introduced to fetching a variety of birds, including live birds
- **Fetches and holds a bird without damaging it
- **Marks a single bird as it falls and retrieves it without delay on land or on water
